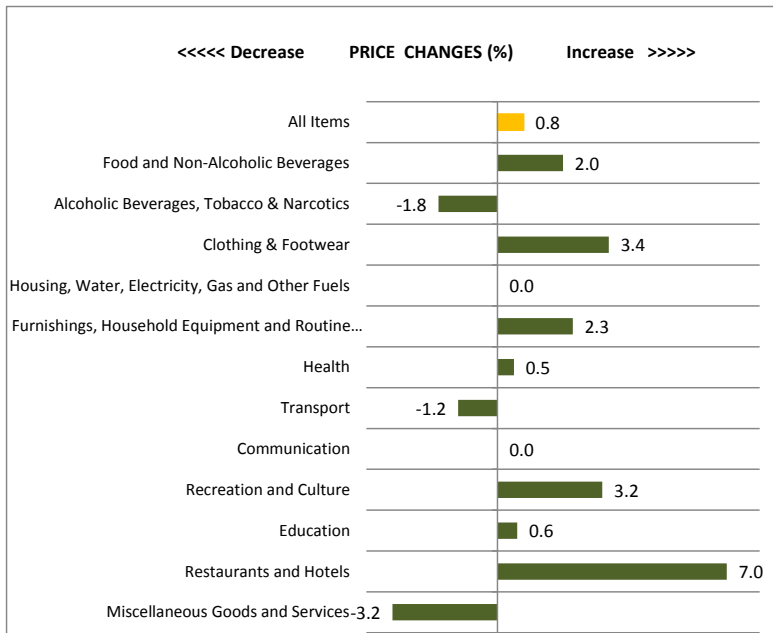

## Headline Inflation: Year-on-Year Changes for Feb 2019 compared to Feb 2018



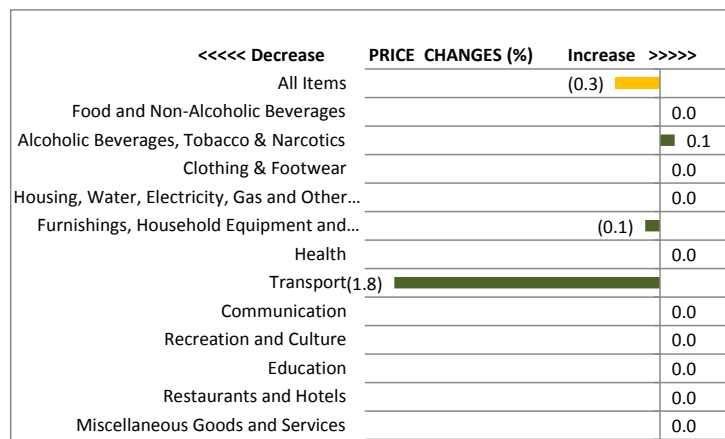
The All Items Index rose 0.8% for the twelve months ending February 2019. The Index for Food increased 2.0% over the last 12 months. Four of the nine major grocery store food groups indexes increased over that span. The largest increase amongst them was reflected in the category Fish and Seafood, which rose 17.6%. The Indexes for Oils and Fats, and Vegetables rose 3.2% and 6.4% respectively. The Index for Non-Alcoholic Beverages advanced 11.1%.

These increases were offset by a decline in the Index for Milk, Cheese and Egg which fell 4.0%. The Index for Meat and Meat Products posted a decline of 2.3%, with five of its six sub groups posting a decline. The Fruit Index and the Sugars, Jam, Honey, Chocolate and Confectionery Index also posted declines.

The Index for All Items less Food and Energy increased 0.5%. The Index for Health increased 0.5%, while the Indexes for Furnishings, Household Equipment and Routine Household Maintenance and Clothing and Footwear increased 2.3% and 3.4% respectively. The Alcoholic Drink and Tobacco Index posted a decrease of 1.8%, with the subgroup Alcoholic Beverages falling 2.5%.

The Energy Index remains unchanged at 0.9%.

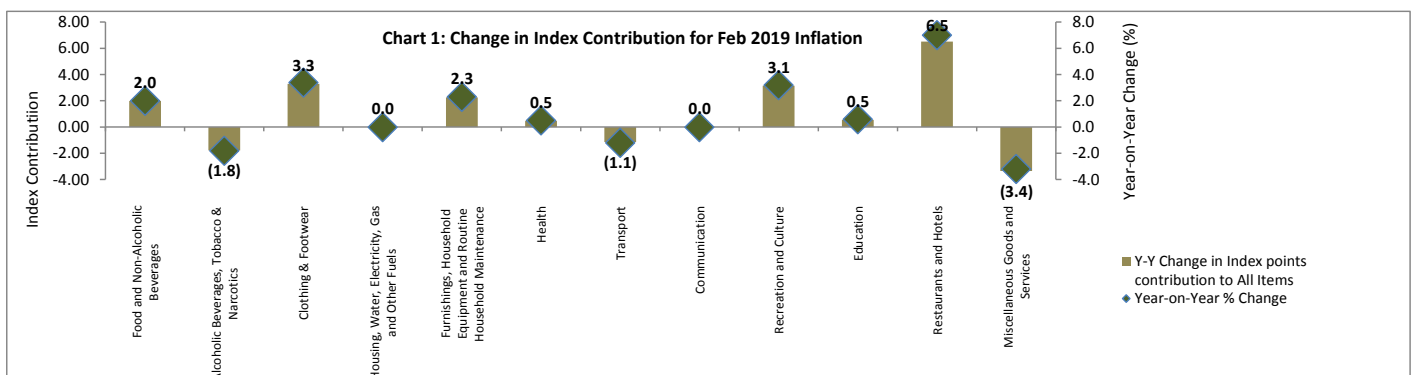
## Month-to-Month Changes for Feb 2019 compared to Jan 2019



The Monthly Consumer Price Index posted a decline of 0.3% for the month of February 2019. The Food index remained unchanged after declining 0.1% in the previous month. Five of the nine major grocery store food groups posted increases over the month. The Index for Fruit rose 2.5%, while the Indexes for Fish and Seafood, Oils and Fats and Sugars, Jams, Honey, Chocolate and Confectionery rose 2.1%, 1.1% and 0.8% respectively.

There were decreases in the food category with the Index for Vegetables posting the largest decrease of 1.5%. The Index for Bread and Cereals fell 0.5%, while the Index for Milk, Cheese and Eggs also fell 0.4%.

The All Items less Food and Energy Index decreased 0.4% as the indexes for the various subcategories were a mix of offsetting increases, declines or remained unchanged. The Indexes for Alcoholic Beverages, Tobacco & Narcotics increased 0.1% with both of its subgroups posting increases. The Indexes for Furnishings, Household Equipment and Routine Household Maintenance and Transport both posted declines at 0.1% and 1.8% respectively. The Indexes for Restaurants and Hotels and Clothing and Footwear remained unchanged at 1.3% and 0.1% respectively.

### What is the Consumer Price Index?

The Consumer Price Index (CPI) is a statistical indicator of changes in the general level of prices of consumer goods and services purchased by private households. The CPI measures price movements of a fixed quality and quantity of goods and services. The mix of these consumer goods and services comprising the CPI are referred to as a "shopping basket." In constructing this "shopping basket", the selected goods and services are organised first by commodity type. They are then divided into sections, then sub-groups and then assigned to a major expenditure category. The Antigua and Barbuda CPI has 26 sections, 30 sub-groups and 11 major categories.

### What is the Base Period?

The base period (base year) is the time period that is used as a reference point for measuring the price change of goods and services. The base period for the Antigua and Barbuda CPI is January 2019.

The base period index is represented as 100.0. (Usually presented as 2001 = 100). So for instance, if the April 2010 CPI for chicken legs is 167.1, then it means that the price for chicken legs has gone up by 67.1% since 2001. Similarly, if the January 2010 CPI for bread is 93.1, then the price of bread has dropped by 6.9% compared to its price in 2001.

### What is Inflation?

Inflation is the process of rising prices, resulting in diminishing purchasing power of a given amount of money. There are three expressions of price changes:

- year-on-year (*the inflation rate*)
- month-to-month
- annual average (or annualised average)

The annual average CPI is derived by summing the CPI for each month of the year and dividing by 12.

### What are Weights?

Weights can be considered in the same way we would express how much we spend on various goods and services each month. Just like a monthly salary can be broken down as 20% on rent, 25% food, 15% mortgage, 10% on utilities and so on, the CPI weights are a collective expression of how households would generally spend their monthly income on goods and services.

The weights for this series of CPI were drawn from a survey of a sample of households in 2006 (the base period). Each household was asked to keep a record of their expenditure for one month. Once completed, the expenditures were added to determine the pattern. This pattern is what is referred to as the weights.

The current weights assume that each month, households would spend the most on *Accommodation* (218.3) followed by *Food* (214.2) and *Transportation and Communication* (153.5). Households would also spend the least on *Alcoholic Drink and Tobacco* (1.6).

### Index Points Contribution

Contribution of each expenditure category (category weight over All Items weight) to the All Items index points change.

The Statistics Division wishes to acknowledge the cooperation of the business community in supplying the required prices and accommodating the Statistical Officers on their premises. Price collection is authorised by the *General Statistics Act, No. 13 of 1975*.

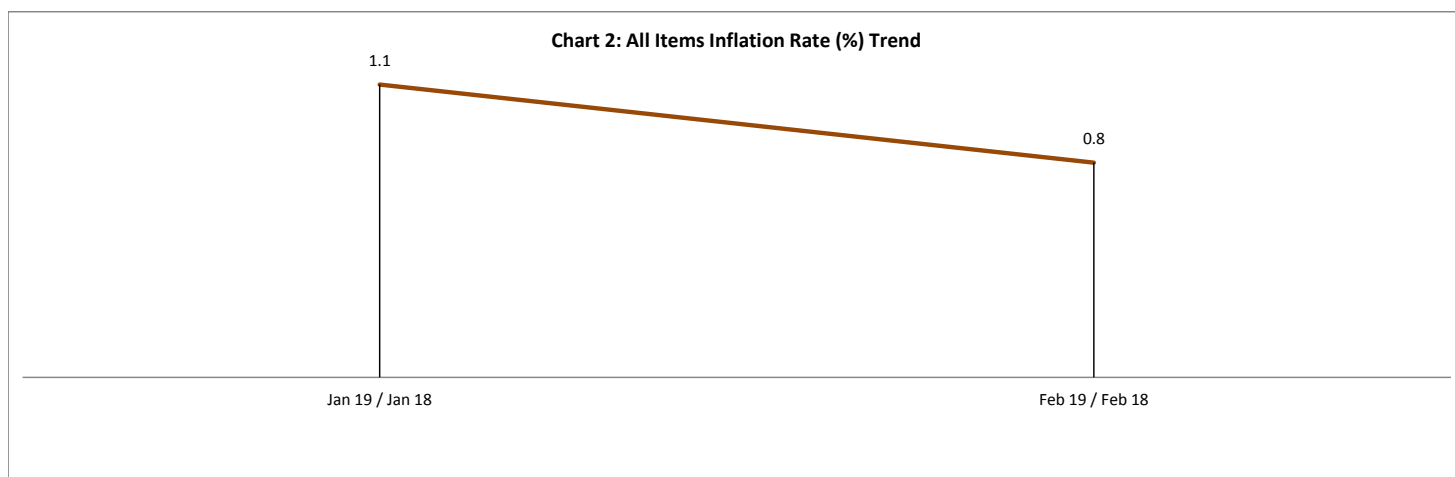

**Table 3 outlines the distribution of price movements for four inflation periods:**

- Feb 2019 compared to Feb 2018
- Jan 2019 compared to Jan 2018
- Feb 2019 compared to Jan 2019

In Feb 2019 compared to Feb 2018, 3 of the 12 main expenditure categories recorded price decreases, while 7 recorded price increases. 13 of the 23 sub-group levels also recorded price increases for some of the items that fall in that level. These collective increases and decreases would account for the magnitude and direction of the current inflation rate. 2 of the 12 main expenditure categories recorded no price changes.
